Course Description

I. Course Objectives

This course aims to develop students' English public speaking skills thereby assisting their future study, passing speaking tests or delivering speeches in future jobs. The course involves a variety of oral activities which focus on enhancing students' mastery of public speaking skills, vocabulary and common expressions for current hot issues and topics, practicing pronunciation, structuring presentations and linking ideas together. Moreover, some useful knowledge on how to survive while staying in English-speaking countries will be discussed. The specific objectives are as follows,

1. To improve students' ability and knowledge of delivering English speeches in terms of organizing speeches, linking ideas, expressing oneself in a decent way. Students will also be able to use appropriate



vocabulary and vast variety of sentence structure to express themselves.

- 2. To facilitate students' preparation for international English-language exams, such as IELTS, TOFEL and GRE, thus helping them feel confident to demonstrate their skills and competence in the test situation.
- 3. To improve their practical application of speaking skills. This will help with job applications and presentation in their future career.

Assessment of Student Performance

₱ Self-Study and Reading ability Practice

Instructor will give out the links of online learning resources for students to learn and practice prior to or after each class; students should be able to show a proactive attitude and ability for self-study and reading. Knowledge and oral English will be elements of homework or presentation score.



Homework

Students should finish their homework by themselves. Copying from others will be treated as cheating and the homework scores will be lowered. Students should hand in all assignments on time. Late assignments will be accepted at the discretion of the instructor (i.e., when the student was ill or had an excused absence). Late assignments without reasonable proof will be reduced in score by 50%.

☞ Attendance

Because the course covers a great deal of material, attending every class session is very important for performing well.

- Being late for 15 minutes or more is considered an absence.
- Five hours or above of unexcused absences will result in the lower level of the final grade by one grade band (e.g. from C - to D +). Any excused absence must be discussed directly with the teacher.
- Absence which is more than 1/3 of the total teaching hours will cause an F (a failing grade) directly.

• An incomplete grade (I) will be considered in case of medical or family emergencies.

Participation

- Students should participate in classes actively. Half of participation grade is determined by their presentation in class. They are encouraged to ask questions relevant to the subject and express their own opinions. Every student should respect the ideas, opinions, and questions of their classmates.
- Students should also use office hours to ask questions or talk with the instructor for good communication and effective learning.
- Frequent visiting the instructor and chatting in English during office hours is highly recommended.
- Any misbehavior and non-class related activities in class will result in the lower level of the participation grade, including ringing cell phones.
