Course Description

I. Course Objectives

This course aims to develop students' English oral skills thereby assisting their future study, passing speaking tests or use in future jobs. The course involves a variety of oral activities which focuses on enhancing students' mastery of vocabulary and common expressions for everyday situations, practicing pronunciation, structuring answers and linking ideas together. Moreover, some useful knowledge on how to survive while staying in English-speaking countries will be discussed, especially,

1. To improve students' ability and knowledge of speaking in terms of organization and logic thinking. Students will also be able to use appropriate vocabulary and vast variety of sentence structure to express themselves.

2. To facilitate students' preparation for exams, such as IELTS, TOFEL and GRE, thus helping them feel



confident to demonstrate their skills and competence in the test situation.

3. To improve their practical application of speaking skills. This will help with job applications and presentation in their future career.

After completing this course, students will be able to:

- master vocabulary and common expressions for everyday situations;
- speak English with proper stress and intonation;
- build fluency and coherence when discussing topics;
- express personal ideas on common topics.
- improve their oral one-on-one speaking skills.

Assessment of Student Performance

☞ Self-Study and Reading ability Practice

Instructor will give out the chapters or the reference books to read and use class hours to have discussion; students should be able to show a proactive attitude and ability for self-study and reading. Knowledge and oral English will be elements of homework or presentation score.

𝕶 Homework

Students should finish their homework by themselves. Copying from others will be treated as cheating and the homework scores will be lowered. Students should hand in all assignments on time. Late assignments will be accepted at the discretion of the instructor (i.e., when the student was ill or had an excused absence). Late assignments without reasonable proof will be reduced in score by 50%.

Attendance

Because the course covers a great deal of material, attending every class session is very important for performing well.



- Being late for 15 minutes or more is considered an absence.
- Five hours or above of unexcused absences will result in the lower level of the final grade by one grade band (e.g. from C to D +). Any excused absence must be discussed directly with the teacher.

• Absence which is more than 1/3 of the total teaching hours will cause an F (a failing grade) directly.

• An incomplete grade (I) will be considered in case of medical or family emergencies.

Participation

- Students should participate in classes actively. Half of participation grade is determined by their presentation in class. They are encouraged to ask questions relevant to the subject and express their own opinions. Every student should respect the ideas, opinions, and questions of their classmates.
- Students should also use office hours to ask questions or talk with the instructor for good communication and effective learning.
- Frequent visiting the instructor and chatting in English during office hours is highly recommended.
- Any misbehavior and non-class related activities in class will result in the lower level of the participation grade, including ringing cell phones.
- All above behaviors will be solely evaluated by the instructor for scoring.
