Course Description

This course aims to develop students' English oral skills thereby assisting their future study, passing speaking tests or use in future jobs. The course involves a variety of oral activities which focuses on enhancing students' mastery of vocabulary and common expressions for everyday situations, practicing pronunciation, structuring answers and linking ideas together. Moreover, some useful knowledge on how



to survive while staying in English-speaking countries will be discussed.

Assessment of Student Performance

☞ Self-Study and Reading ability Practice

Instructor will give out the chapters or the reference books to read and use class hours to have discussion; students should be able to show a proactive attitude and ability for self-study and reading. Knowledge and oral English will be elements of homework or presentation score.

☞ Homework

Students should finish their homework by themselves. Copying from others will be treated as cheating and the homework scores will be lowered. Students should hand in all assignments on time. Late assignments will be accepted at the discretion of the instructor (i.e., when the student was ill or had an excused absence). Late assignments without reasonable proof will be reduced in score by 50%.

☞ Attendance

Because the course covers a great deal of material, attending every class session is very important for performing well.
